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# Learn the sounds of Fire Safety for National Fire Prevention Week

The National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA), the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week™ for more than 95 years, has announced "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety™" as the theme for Fire Prevention Week 2021, October 3-9. From beeps to chirps, this year's campaign works to better educate the public about the sounds smoke alarms make, what those sounds mean, and how to respond to them.

"Smoke alarms have played a leading role in reducing fire death rates over the past 40 years, but we still have more work to do in maximizing their effectiveness," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA vice president of Outreach and Advocacy.

According to the latest NFPA "Smoke Alarms in the U.S." report, working smoke alarms in the home reduce the risk of dying in a reported fire by more than half. However, almost three out of five home fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms (41 percent) or smoke alarms that

failed to operate (16 percent); missing or non-functional power sources, including missing or disconnected batteries, dead batteries, and disconnected hardwired alarms or other AC power issues, are the most common factors when smoke alarms fail to operate.

The White House Fire Department will be out in the community even more during the month of October to educate citizens about the risks associated with faulty fire alarms. They will be participating in the Discover White House Expo & Safety Day on Saturday, October 2. There will be a Community Breakfast at Station #2 with breakfast provided courtesy of Bojangles' on Tuesday, October 12 from 8 am to 9 am. And finally, they will be participating in the annual Fall Family Block Party on October 22 at the White House Municipal Park.

As I write today, we are enduring a second wave of the COVID 19 virus. The hospitals in

both our counties are overflowing with COVID positive patients and many in the area have become ill with several passing away. My hope is that as you read this message the second wave has passed and that you and your family have endured.

Managing government operations in a time of a pandemic, high inflation, difficulty in finding workers to fill vacant positions, and expanding growth has been very challenging. Your management team of nine department heads all have years of experience. Five have master's degrees and the other four have bachelor's degrees. Every one of them has led their departments with confidence, sharing hope and strength through this most difficult time. Your Board of Mayor and Aldermen and I appreciate all they do to provide exceptional quality service to you.

The 2020 decennial census numbers have recently been released to us. At the time of the certification, our population was set at 12,982. This is up 2,727 from the 2010 census (10,255) a 26% increase. With all the growth you see happening you may be surprised to learn that we added less residents this past decade than we did in each of the previous two decades. Between 2000 and 2010 we grew by 3,035 residents a 42% increase over the previous decade of 7,220. Between 1990 and 2000 we grew by 4,233 a 141% increase over the previous decade of 2,987.



Consider Spring Hill, a city to the south of Nashville, that in 2000 our populations were fairly equal at just over 7,000. The 2020 census for Spring Hill is just over 50,000! So in those 20 years we added just fewer than 6,000 new residents while Spring Hill added approximately 43,000 new residents. When you look at the new census numbers around the Nashville area you will see growth that far exceeds what we have experienced: look at Gallatin, Mount Juliet, Smyrna, Nolensville, and Hendersonville.

We all know that growth has its challenges. Your Board of Mayor and Aldermen and your Planning Commission understands the difficulties. Just to simply deny every request that comes before these boards from private land owners is in most cases not an option. The City has invested wisely in developing a public involved Comprehensive Master Plan and use that plan in making decisions on requests for land usage. Our State Legislature has passed several laws in the past few years to restrict cities from interfering in land ownership uses such as annexation of land, design standards, and allowing residential uses for short term rentals.

Our volunteer Planning Commission members have to continuously balance their decisions based on all the above factors. It's not an easy position to be in yet they serve because they have a heart for this City. I would recommend that you get involved and come to their meetings. When you actually spend time with them, you will learn that they really do care about managing growth in the City in a responsible way. Remember they get no pay or benefits yet endure the criticism. Until next time, may you be safe, happy, healthy, and doing your best to give someone a smile.

# WHFD responds to disastrous flooding in Waverly







On August 21 severe storms and flash floods impacted four middle Tennessee communities: Dickson, Hickman, Houston and Humphreys. The City of Waverly in Humphreys County was one of the hardest hit areas, losing 19 residents from their



small town in the devastating flood. A total of 20 people in all lost their lives.

The City of White House Fire Department quickly responded to the devastation by sending firefighters to offer aid during the clean up efforts. On Friday, August 27, Captain Cary Pettit, Lieutenant Matthew Detlefsen and firefighters Craig Flora and Morgan Marks traveled to Waverly for a single day assignment to assist with logistics and supplies.

Tennessee Emergency Management said in Middle Tennessee, anywhere from 9 to 17 inches of rain fell within a 6-hour time period. In some areas of Humphreys County, 17 inches of rain was recorded on that fateful day.

The Trading Card Program is designed to help the children become familiar with the officers and firefighters in their community as well as develop a trusted bond. The goal is for the youth in the community and the police officers and firefighters to interact and promote a positive and trusting relationship for years to come. Any

citizen of any age is welcome to ask an officer or firefighter for their card.

Please do NOT approach officers or firefighters while they are engaged in the course of their duties (responding to a call, during a motor vehicle stop, medical call, etc). Your safety is our primary concern.

# Cooking Safety

Cooking brings family and friends together, provides an outlet for creativity and can be relaxing. But did you know that cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries? By following a few safety tips you can prevent these fires.

#### "COOK WITH CAUTION"

- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove or stovetop.
- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your stovetop.

## If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire...

- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

## If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire...

- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.
- Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number from outside the home.



Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 metre) around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared

### FACTS

- The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking.
- Most cooking fires in the home involve the kitchen stove.





activities for this year's Christmas parade "A Hometown Christmas ... Past, Present & Future" including a grand stand where emcees will announce the parade entries and provide some history and other information as the parade rounds the corner of Highways 76 and 31W.

The grand stand will be at the City Hall Complex and following the parade there will be the annual Christmas on Main Street Celebration that will include free refreshments, live entertainment from local schools, the sealing of the official time capsule, free photos with Santa and the official tree lighting ceremony for White House. Organizers

are in the process of finalizing all of the fun details but we encourage those not already at the city hall complex for the parade to make their way back to enjoy the ongoing celebration.

"We really want to encourage people to register in advance for the Christmas parade so we can have complete information for the emcees," said Parks Director Kevin Whittaker. 

# **WHPD Encourages the** #9PMRoutine

In an effort to keep our community safe and combat issues before they arise, the City of White House Police Department will be promoting the #9pmRoutine. The 9PM routine is a nightly reminder to residents to remove valuables from their vehicles, lock their vehicle doors, lock the doors to their residences, turn on exterior lights and activate all alarms and security systems.

We will send out a nightly reminder on social media around 9pm to lock up. We ask residents to set a nightly reminder on their smartphones or other devices that will remind them to follow the 9PM routine.

Criminals look for easy targets. You can deter them by following the 9PMRoutine! Many thefts from vehicles, and to a lesser degree, stolen vehicles, occur as a result of vehicles being left unlocked. Criminals walk through neighborhoods trying vehicle door handles hoping to find an unlocked vehicle. The best way to prevent thefts from vehicles is to remove all of your valuables, lock your vehicle's doors, and take the keys to the vehicle inside your residence.

# WHPD and WHITE HOUSE KROGER Participate in DEA's Nationwide Prescription "Drug Take-Back Day"



The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and its community partners will hold the fifth annual National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day at sites throughout the United States on October 23rd, 2021 (10AM-2PM local time). This will be an opportunity for the public to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs for safe disposal.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety

and public health issue. Prescription drugs are being misused and abused at alarming rates in the United States—more Americans currently abuse prescription drugs than the number of those using cocaine, hallucinogens, and heroin combined, according to the 2009 National Survey on Drug Use and Health. Many Americans are not aware that medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse.

# Recycling and its disadvantages



Recycling in the U.S. is broken. In 1960, Americans generated 2.68 pounds of garbage per day; by 2017, it had grown to an average of 4.51 pounds. And while many Americans dutifully put items into their recycling bins, much of it does not actually end up being recycled.

Many recyclables become contaminated when items are placed in the wrong bin, or when a dirty food container gets into the recycling bin. Contamination can prevent large batches of material from being recycled. Other materials can't be processed in certain facilities.

For decades, China handled the recycling of almost half of the world's discarded materials, because its manufacturing sector was booming and needed these materials to feed it. In 2016, the U.S. exported 16 million tons of plastic, paper and metals to China. In actuality, 30 percent of these mixed recyclables were ultimately contaminated by non-recyclable material, were never recycled, and ended up polluting China's countryside and oceans.

In 2018, China's National Sword policy banned the import of most plastics and other materials that were not up to new, more stringent purity standards. The U.S. then sent its plastic waste to other countries, shipping 68,000 containers to Vietnam, Malaysia, and Thailand in 2018. When these countries later instituted bans on imported plastic waste, the U.S. diverted its waste to Cambodia, Bangladesh, Ghana, Laos, Ethiopia, Kenya and Senegal — countries with cheap labor and lax environmental rules.

Without the Chinese market for plastic — as well as for some types of cardboard, paper, and glass — the U.S. recycling industry was upended.

As a result, U.S. processing facilities and municipalities have either had to pay more to recycle or simply discard the waste. In 2017, Stamford, CT made \$95,000 by selling recyclables; in 2018, it had to pay \$700,000 to have

A stormwater fee is often based on how much impervious surface contributes to stormwater runoff from a property. There are over 1600 stormwater utilities in the United States and Canada. Our goals include protecting our environment; reducing flooding to protect people and property; upgrading drainage systems; ditch maintenance; supporting healthy streams and rivers; and creating a more sustainable community. These services are funded by the Stormwater Utility Fee.

them removed. Bakersfield, CA used to earn \$65 a ton from its recyclables; after 2018, it had to pay \$25 a ton to get rid of them. Franklin, NH had been able to sell its recyclables for \$6 a ton; now the transfer station charges \$125 a ton to recycle the material or \$68 a ton to incinerate it. White House, TN recycling program made a small profit in FY 14/15 \$2,473, as of FY 15/16 we made \$19.08 and starting in FY16/17 the city has lost money and has tried to absorb costs without increasing costs onto our residents. Last fiscal year the city spent 25,196.02 in recycling fees.

Municipalities that couldn't afford to pay more have cut back on their recycling programs. Over 70 ended curbside recycling, and many drop-off sites closed; some programs increased costs to residents while others limited what materials they would accept.

It's taken several decades, but the actions of hundreds of US cities suggest Americans are finally willing to entertain the idea that recycling is not a moral or legal imperative.


