

Celebrating 50 years one last time at Christmas on Main Street & Hometown Christmas Parade

The City's year-long celebration of the 50th Anniversary of Incorporation will culminate with the city's annual Christmas parade and tree lighting ceremony. The Christmas Parade with the theme "Hometown Christmas: Past, Present & Future" will feature the city's mayors over the past 50 years, and will even have a special 'Mayor for the Day' selected to flip the switch at the tree lighting ceremony. The parade will be held on Saturday, December 4 at 3:00 pm.

Immediately following the parade at the Library and City Hall complex, we will celebrate a Main Street Christmas presented by Tractor Supply Co. Choirs from HB Williams, Heritage Elementary, White House High School, Heritage High School, and Life Christian Academy will entertain guests with festive Christmas music. The Library will be hosting their annual open house offering pictures with Santa, an ornament making station and a Letters to Santa station. The White House Dulcimer Players will entertain guests inside the library.

Outside in the roundabout, on the Honey Run Boutique stage, will be a time capsule ceremony, the reading of 'Twas the Night Before Christmas, the lighting of the Christmas tree, and more. There will be refreshment stations located throughout the festival area featuring hot cocoa from The Friends of the Library, cookies and milk from White House Utility District, and homemade kettle corn.

The celebration will conclude with a candlelight ceremony heralding in the Christmas season for the City of White House. Don't miss this historic event!


We are excited to report that COVID 19

cases and related deaths have taken a nose dive since the last Word on White House was published. Reports in both our Robertson County and Sumner County sides have been very good these past few weeks. It sure would be great to get this pandemic fully behind us in the next few months.

There has been a movement amongst cities across Tennessee to deactivate their Regional Planning Commission authority and only have authority within their city limits. The State of Tennessee Local Government Planning Advisory Committee has the authority to approve such requests. We had decided several months back to start the process of deactivation. With state law changes in regards to annexations, the fact that the counties exercise planning authority in their jurisdictions overriding our planning authority in our growth boundary areas, and that we have two members on the Planning Commission that live in the counties we had no reason to keep regional status for planning. On October 27th, we had a hearing with

the Local Government Planning Advisory Committee seeking deactivation. Two other cities were on their agenda seeking likewise. We all were approved with stipulations to obtain resolutions from our county Planning Commissions (a new requirement after we had submitted our package) stating that they would be responsible for planning in our growth boundary areas. We should have both Robertson and Sumner County resolutions approved by the end of this calendar year. We plan to keep our City Planning Commission at seven members. We will have two vacancies as a result of this change. Mayor Arnold has the responsibility to appoint replacements and is considering applications to fill vacancies from those that live within the city limits. Applications can be found at our website under boards if you are interested in serving.

As a result of the 2020 census, each jurisdiction, State, County, and Municipal in the United States has the responsibility to review their established districts and modify to shifting populations. We formed a redistricting committee that reviewed our census data and our four wards and recommended modifications. The wards were modified in such a way to keep an equal distribution of population in each of the four wards without giving any district electoral advantage. The Board of Mayor and Alderman has the authority to approve of the redistricting by ordinance. As of this writing the Board had approved the first reading, of two required, for passage. The approved redistricting map is sent to both county board of elections and to the State Comptroller for filing. We have included the new map with this newsletter. The ward changes will affect next November's elections for Alderman so please review the map.



We have had several new business ribbon cuttings in the past couple of months. We hope that you shop local with them. Your shopping keeps them in business and provides the City with sales taxes that we use for improving our parks and providing quality service to you. Please join us at our last 50th anniversary event of the year as we conclude with a Christmas Parade and festive activities at City Hall. Until next time may you be safe, happy, and healthy.








In the 'Planners Corner' series, we will explore the City Planner's (Planning and Codes Department) role to help the community reach its goals and vision, through various strategies and tools

PLANNING & CODES - Part 2: Who are we and how we serve the citizens?



In the previous edition of word on White House, I provided the goals and objectives of how the planning and codes department serves the City of White House.

In this edition of the planners corner I will focus on What, How and Why a Long-Range Planning is created.

City governments provide many important services, but one function stands apart in its impact on future generations; the authority to engage in community planning and zoning. Comprehensive plans (Long Range Plan) and zoning ordinances adopted and enforced by the city, affect the future layout and landscape of a city for many years to come. Whether it is the development or preservation of open space, or the redevelopment and revival of existing properties, what a community will look like well into the future depends on decisions made today. The 2040 Long Range Plan is intended to be a policy guide for the City of White House to use in decision making for transportation and land use development that aims to leverage growth, development and investment to make the City a socially and economically vibrant community.

The Comprehensive Plan is intended to meet certain legal requirements set forth in the Tennessee Code Annotated (TCA) Title 13 Chapter 4 Part 2, which states that "it is the function and duty of the planning commission to make and adopt an official general plan for the physical development of the municipality."

A comprehensive plan is an expression of the community's vision for the future and a strategic map to reach that vision. Comprehensive planning is an important tool for cities to guide future development of land to ensure a safe, pleasant, and economical environment for residential, commercial, industrial, and public activities. Planning can help:

• Preserve important natural resources, agricultural land, and other open lands

• Create the opportunity for residents to participate in guiding a community's future

• Identify issues, stay ahead of trends, and accommodate change

• Ensure that growth makes the community better, not just bigger

• Foster sustainable economic development

• Ensure more efficient and cost-effective infrastructure and public services

• Provide an opportunity to consider future implications of today's decisions

• Protect property rights and values

• Enable other public and private entities to plan their activities in harmony with the municipality's plans

The current White House 2040 Plan was approved in May 2019 by the Planning Commission. The planning process took twelve months and included analysis from citizen input and staff engagement.

One public meeting was held that provided an open platform for citizens and stakeholders to engage in the White House 2040 comprehensive planning process. The public meeting was held on April, 17, 2018. The meeting was an open-house and provided stations for stakeholders to engage with City Staff and the consultant team to discuss each Plan resulting from the White House Comprehensive Planning Process. Additional public meetings were held November 12, 2018, December 10, 2018, and January 14, 2019 to allow for additional review, comment, and feedback. In addition to the public meetings, a survey was distributed in order to solicit public feedback from a wide range of stakeholders.

This serves as one of many avenues in managing the growth of the city. The purpose of the academy is to give citizens the opportunity to learn about police work in general and also gain insight into the White House Police Department's daily operations and programs. The Academy will be held on Monday nights from 6:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. for ten weeks. The classes are open to citizens 18 years of age and older and will

meet at the White House Police Department. Class size is limited to 25 participants. The Academy is not designed to make participants certified police officers, nor does it give the graduates authority to act as police officers. The focus of the curriculum is to provide an informative overview of the fundamentals of police operations and community crime prevention. This two-way communication will certainly be an effective and successful way to build a partnership between the community and the police department.

It's the Season for Shop with a Cop/Firefighter



It's fun to decorate for the winter holidays, but holiday decorations can increase your risk for a home fire. As you deck the halls this season, be fire smart.



Half of the home decoration fires in December are started by candles.



More than 1/3 of home decoration fires are started by candles.

> A dry Christmas tree can burn very hot and

very fast.



Christmas is the peak day for candle fires.



Keep candles at least **12 inches** away from anything that burns.



Read manufacturer's instructions for the number of light strands to connect.



Make sure your tree is **at least 3 feet away** from heat sources like fireplaces, radiators, space heaters, candles or heat vents. Also, make sure your tree does not block exits.



More than 1 in every 5 Christmas tree fires were caused by a heat source too close to the tree.



Get rid of your tree after Christmas or when it is dry.


