What a blessing it is to live in this great State of Tennessee. Like so many of you my wife Lori, our adult children, and me left our home State fifteen years ago to live in a place with moderate weather, no income tax, low property tax, kind people, good values, and of course to hear live the best music and to see the most talented musicians in the world!! With that said, with so many of us moving here, how can a small city like White House keep up with the growth?

At a presentation to the White House Chamber of Commerce I had an opportunity to share with them the impacts of growth and how city departments are actively addressing current and future growth. Our city departments collect enormous amounts of data and formulate this data into a monthly report. These department reports are collated into a monthly report that are placed into the Board of

Mayor and Alderman agenda packets and placed on our web site for public viewing. Please scan the QR code to connect directly to these reports. In these reports you will find valuable information laid out in tables, charts, graphs, and photos. Departments each have measurable goals that they use to help guide their decision making as it relates to staffing, program effectiveness, workplace safety, areas in need of training, and budgetary efficiencies.

For the past ten years the city staff has grown by an average of 3 new full-time employees each year. In the past three years 909 single family homes were built. Our population since the 2020 Census of nearly 13,000 is estimated to have grown by more than 2,000. Our crimes against property and persons have remained stable for the

past five years (a good indicator that we have well behaved citizens). Fire calls have been steadily increasing over the past five years, mainly due to emergency medical calls. We have posted my presentation on growth on social media and our web site. We would encourage you

to review the presentation for more data and facts on growth and how we are addressing these concerns.

May you and your loved ones be safe, happy, and healthy throughout the autumn months.





In the 'Planners Corner' series, we will explore a brief overview of the Planning and Codes Department's day to day operations.



What we do

The Planning and Codes Department consists of Planning, Building Inspections/Code Enforcement and Property Maintenance. I have written about the Planning aspect of the department in several editions of Word on White House, but the other divisions are equally as important. Our Staff consists of a Planning Administrative Assistant, two Building Inspectors and a Planning Technician.

Property Maintenance

We receive hundreds of requests for service each year. These requests include tenant complaints about poor housing conditions and neighbor complaints of blight on commercial and residential properties. Our Planning Technician inspects and enforces

property maintenance and code complaints, such as high grass, junk and debris, unfenced swimming pools and inoperable vehicles. Since we have a small Planning department, we operate on complaint basis, though we try to be as proactive by monitoring sign violations without permits and signs such as yard sale signs that were never

removed after the sale was over. Our staff will research the complaint and take the appropriate action. Should violations be identified during an inspection, the Code Official (inspector) issues a Notice of Violation and/or a Civil Citation to the owner or responsible person for the property.




Building Inspections

Our inspectors are responsible for 20 different types of permits and inspections, from new residential and commercial, to renovations, swimming pools and deck permits and inspections. Both Tony Covington and Sean Hagan have multiple certifications, as required by the state and under the International Building Code. Since January 1, 2022 they have done 4,617 inspections. During the building process, though it may be a new single unit needing an inspection,

(commercial, industrial, or residential) the building inspectors will do 15-20 inspections per unit. If an inspection fails, the re-inspections add to the total inspections per unit. If dealing with inspections were not enough, staff must review the actual building plans prior to issuing a building permit. Before a development is built, they will review each plan/layout to make sure they will be up to code.

Planning Office Day to Day

The office stays busy with phone calls and walk ins. The Planning Administrative Assistant answers a wide variety of planning and codes questions and administers the permit and inspection process. Chances are, if you call, Rita Hobbs will answer the phone. She has been with the city for over 20 years. In addition to the thousands of calls she answers, she helps citizens with locations of easements on their property and answers zoning and land use questions.

Keeping Fats, Oils, and Grease out of the Sewer System

Explains the impact of dis- FOG discharged into posing of fats, oil, and tic systems and drain grease in the sewer system. can cause malfunction

Fats, oils, and grease (FOG) comes from meat fats in food scraps, cooking oil, shortening, lard, butter and margarine, gravy, and food products such as mayonnaise, salad dressings, and sour cream.

FOG poured down kitchen drains accumulates inside sewer pipes. As the FOG builds up, it restricts the flow in the pipe and can cause untreated wastewater to back up into homes and businesses, resulting in high costs for cleanup and restoration.

Grinder Tanks, Lift Stations, and Manholes can overflow into parks, yards, streets, and storm drains, allowing FOG to contaminate local waters, including drinking water. Exposure to untreated wastewater is a public-health hazard.

FOG discharged into septic systems and drain fields can cause malfunctions, resulting in more frequent tank pump-outs and other expenses.

Restaurants, cafeterias, and fastfood establishments spend tens of thousands of dollars on plumbing emergencies each year to deal with grease blockages and pump out grease traps and interceptors.

Communities spend billions of dollars every year unplugging or replacing grease-blocked pipes, repairing pump stations, and cleaning up costly and illegal wastewater spills. Excessive FOG in the sewer system can affect local wastewater rates.

So, keeping FOG out of the sewer system helps everyone in the community.





Vehicle Washing

All the soap, scum, and oily grit runs along the curb, and then into the storm drain and directly into our streams, lakes, and tributaries. As a result, causes pollution, which is unhealthy for the fish and other aquatic life. So how do you avoid this whole mess? Easy. Wash your car on grass or gravel instead of the street. More preferably, take it to a car wash where the water gets treated and recycled.

Clean water is important to all of us and it's up to all of us to make it happen. In recent years, sources of water pollution like industrial wastes from factories have been greatly reduced. Now, more than 60 percent of water pollution comes from things like cars leaking oil, fertilizers from farms and gardens, and failing septic tanks. All these sources add up to a big pollution problem. But each of us can do small things to help clean up our water too; that adds up to a pollution solution!

Why do we need clean water? Having clean water is of primary importance for our health and economy. Clean water provides recreation, commercial opportunities, fish habitat, drinking water, and adds beauty to our landscape. All of us benefit from clean wa-

ter and all of us have a role in getting and keeping our lakes, rivers, marine and ground waters clean.

What's the problem with car washing? There's no problem with washing your car. It's just how and where you do it. Most soap contains phosphates and other chemicals that harm fish and water quality. The soap, together with the dirt and oil washed from your car, flows into nearby storm drains which run directly into lakes, rivers or marine waters. The phosphates from the soap can cause excess algae to grow. Algae looks bad, smells bad, and harm water quality. As algae decay, the process uses up oxygen in the water that fish need.

Clean Water tip: How can you wash your car and help keep our waters clean? Use soap sparingly. Use a hose nozzle with a trigger to save water. Wash your car on a grassy area so the ground can filter the water naturally. Best of all, take your car to a commercial car wash, especially if you plan to clean the engine or the bottom of your car. Most car washes reuse wash water several times before sending it to the sewer system for treatment and not into our stormwater infrastructure.


