



The Museum and its volunteers were able to get back into the schools for their presentations this year for the first time since COVID.

Splash Pad Maintenance Building











 - Ample space, tables and chairs for all sorts of activities and events










Pickle Ball


Senior Lunches


Pavilion Rental Revenue




Ballfield Rental Revenue
