


New & Improved Trail of Treats

We were finally able to get a building (mostly) constructed to provide shelter for our splash pad pumps, motors, and electrical equipment this year. This, along with the ongoing Rec Center construction, forced us to shut down the splash pad this year but we anticipate it opening back up next summer and will hopefully run much more smoothly as a result of us having this building.

Taking Care of What We Have





Dog Park Drainage Project









We had a bare and washed out area near the entrance to the large dog area of the dog park. We installed some drains and put up a wood border around the area and filled in with playground mulch to help fix the issue.





Drainage Project in back of Park





We dug a drainage ditch and placed rip-rap rock inside it to help with drainage in the back of the park next to the Jr. Pro Football Field.





Quad Drainage Project







We have recently had issues in the Quad around the Field 1 dugouts with standing water. This forced people to walk through it to get to the dugouts. We installed a new drain in that area to fix the issue.





Playground Restoration





We were finally able to get some issues fixed at our playground at the Municipal Park. We had to replace some mechanisms on the swing that caused it to be inoperable for a long time. We also had several spots that had worn out and we were able to get those filled in. Finally, a generous citizen painted a safety border around the swing.

Greenway Repairs







We fixed spots on the Greenway that have washed out next to the asphalt. We added gravel and poured concrete to help with any further damage.

We also borrowed a walk behind grinder from Public Works and smoothed out some high spots in the asphalt that were tripping hazards at the park and along Greenway

We put down landscape stone in the beds at the quad parking lot and also added a couple shrubs. We will continue to do this in our beds around our parks periodically.












Gym Maintenance

Our Civic Center gymnasium remains in use throughout the year. As a result, there is plenty of maintenance required to keep it running smoothly. These included:








Fun & Games

This year, we averaged over 140 people for each meal and had over 7,000 participants this year, which is over 2,500 more than we had last year and approximately a 63% increase!




Removed Dirt Pile





This dirt pile grew over several years of our gravedigger dumping dirt from burials in this spot.






