

Happy Holidays to all of you! We just ended the month of thanksgiving and gratitude. Now it's time to run into the month of giving, festivities, and resolutions. We hope many of you can participate in and or watch from the sidelines at our annual Christmas parade. This year's parade is sure to please with the theme "Christmas Movies." We have purchased a new Christmas Tree that is nearly twice the size of the one we have used for many years. The new tree will be in front of the library. The old tree has found a new home in front of the Visitor Center/Chamber of Commerce

office. Also, we have purchased

additional intersection decora-

tions to expand out from the City

center westward on SR76 to I-65

and southward along US31W.

Your Chamber of Commerce, led by Mandy Christenson, is a wonderful partner to work with. We help each other with many programs throughout the year such as the Christmas parade, Music in the Park, Americana, and many others. Once a year the Chamber allows me to present to their members information concerning governmen-

tal operations, and the expansion of business and industry. Here is a summary of information passed along to the members at their October luncheon:

• Our certified population from the 2020 census was 13,000 residents.

• We have issued 1,189 single family unit permits since

- The average number of people per household is 2.8 residents.
- $1,189 \times 2.8 = 3,329$  new residents added these past three years.
- Current estimated population 16,329.
- We have 3,117 single family units and 1,290 multi-family units approved but not yet fully built out. If all these units get built without

December 2023/January 2024 any additional added our population will grow to 28,668.

- If the build out trend continues at current pace it could take 8.6 years or less to reach this population.
- Commercial growth is expanding. As previously reported, we are getting a new shopping center anchored by Publix. Charter Assisted Living is opening in late spring with 54 assisted living residential rooms and 25 memory care. There are two new convenience/ fueling centers under construction. Liberty Market Shell is going in on US31W at Business Park Drive. Speedway is going in at the corner of SR76 and Dee Cee Road. Express Oil plans to tear down the old Rods Tire and construct two new buildings.
- Industrial growth is expanding. Core 5 is building a 300,000 square foot building for light industrial use along I-65 behind the Loves Travel Center. We have two new industries planning to build in the Brinkley Industrial Park. SRM, a concrete plant, and Stutzwire, a precision machine shop, have been approved for construction. Exotic Marble is building a new facility on Union Road. In our next edition, I will cover some of our governmental projects. May you be safe, happy, healthy, and warm during the winter

## **Why Should I Care About Stormwater?**


We are all part of a watershed. Watersheds are land areas that drain to the nearest body of water. For example, if you are in middle Tennessee, you are part of the Middle Cumberland watershed. Smaller local creeks and streams also eventually drain to a larger local water body.

## **Flooding**

When excess water has nowhere to go, flooding can impact property and cause damage to land and structures. Flooding can also be a public safety issue that affects entire communities.

## **Pollution and Health Impacts**

Stormwater picks up anything that is on the ground and carries it along with it. Animal waste, chemicals, pesticides, oil, and sediment - all end up in waterways and potentially in our sources of drinking water.



## **Streambank Erosion**

Uncontrolled stormwater can cause streambank erosion, leaving bare soil and exposing tree roots. This can lead to property damage and cause issues with streambank stability.

### **Sedimentation**

Erosion and runoff, can also lead

to sedimentation. Sedimentation of waterways from runoff causes changes to aquatic habitats. Undesirable plant growth increases, water becomes more turbid or cloudy, which leads to disruption of aquatic ecosystems. Sedimentation also fills in waterways, which can increase the flooding potential.


## **Impacts to Groundwater** Recharge

If stormwater isn't sinking into the ground, it can affect recharge of groundwater resources. This can affect water levels in drinking water wells as well as impacting levels in surface water.

## **Impacts to Recreational Opportunities**

Stormwater runoff can cause polluted waterways which can lead to restrictions on boating, swimming, and fishing in recreational areas.

Making changes to how stormwater is managed can go a long way to reduce negative impacts. Even small actions by individual homeowners like using a rain barrel, choosing permeable landscaping surfaces, or installing a rain garden can make a difference. Stormwater affects everyone!

## **Holiday Safety Tips**

In an effort to help make this the safest of holiday seasons, the White House Police Department is encouraging citizens to pay particular attention to their surroundings during the holidays.

Police offer the following holiday safety tips while shopping:

- Stay alert to your surroundings and the people around you.
- Shop with a friend whenever possible. There is safety in numbers.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- Pay for purchases with a check or credit card.
- If possible, carry only your driver's license, necessary credit cards or personal checks.
- If you must carry a purse, do not wrap straps around your arms or shoulders. You could risk injury from a would-be purse-snatcher.
- Do not carry wallets in a back pocket.

- When possible, slip bags/purchases in a nondescript bag(s).
- Watch your purchases while eating in mall food courts; bags can be easi ly snatched.
- Have your car keys ready in hand before leaving the store.
- -Ask shopping center security for escort to your car if you are uncomfort able walking alone.
- Glance in the back seat and under your vehicle before getting in.
- Don't leave packages in your vehicle in plain view. Lock them in your trunk and out of sight.

Report all suspicious/criminal activity to the White House Police Department at 672-4903. Always dial 9-1-1 for all life threatening emergencies.







## **Holiday Safety**

The Holiday season is quickly approaching! Before long we'll be stuffing ourselves with turkey and waiting on a visit from Santa Claus. The holiday season can be both exciting and stressful, and as a result, we at the Fire Department see an uptick in serious incidents. The most common of these incidents are cooking and electrical fires. Enjoy your holidays to the fullest, and follow our tips below to stay as safe as possible throughout the season.

## **Turkey Fryer Safety**

You've likely seen YouTube videos showing what can happen when a turkey fryer is used improperly. Needless to say, the results can be catastrophic. Improper use of these fryers can result in devastating burns, and will quickly ignite anything nearby. Check out these safety tips to fry your bird safely:

- Always use the fryer outdoors on a flat surface, safely away from structures, wooden decks, and covered patios. No matter what, DO NOT be tempted to use the fryer in a garage.
- Have the correct kind of fire extinguisher nearby and ready to use.
- Use your safety tools: Oven mitts, gloves, and safety goggles.
- Ensure the turkey is COM-PLETELY THAWED to prevent a fire or explosion hazard.
- Raise and lower the tur-

splatter, burns, and fire. Do not leave the fryer unattended. Monitor the temperature of the oil with a thermometer to prevent the oil from over-

key slowly to prevent oil

heating and catching fire. If the oil begins to smoke, immediately turn the gas off. Keep children and pets away

from the fryer to prevent tipping, even after the turkey is done. The oil is dangerously hot for hours.

**REMEMBER**: Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires. The day has three times the average number of reported home structure fires involved with cooking equipment.

## Christmas Tree Safety

### **Artificial Trees:**

- When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label "Fire-Retardant." Although this label does not mean the tree will not catch fire, it does indicate that the tree will resist burning and extinguish quickly.
- When using light strings on an artificial tree that is not pre-lit, check to make sure that the light strings are certified and have a gold holographic UL label.
- When removing lights from storage, inspect the strings for broken or cracked lamp holders, frayed or bare wires and loose connections. Replace any light strings that are damaged with new UL-Listed light strings.

## **Live Trees:**

When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness:

- The needles are green.
- The needles are hard to pull from the branches.
- The needles bend between your fingers without breaking.
- The lower trunk is sticky with resin.
- The tree does not lose many needles when tapped on the ground.

## Setting up:

- Cut off about two inches of the trunk to expose fresh wood for better water absorption.
- Keep the stand filled with water.
  Heated rooms rapidly dry live
  trees. A tree absorbs as much
  as a gallon of water in the first
  24 hours and about a quart
  of water each day thereafter.
- It is best to discard live trees within one month after purchase.
- When Christmas is over or the tree begins to drop needles, dispose of it.
- Do not store live trees in the house or garage.


## **General Tree Safety Tips**

- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents, or lights.
- Use a step stool or stepladder when decorating the tree's

higher limbs. Ensure all climbing devices are in good condition. Many accidents occur each year when people fall while decorating for the holidays.


- Never use lit candles on an artificial or live tree or near other evergreens.
- Check each set of lights, new or old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections. Discard damaged sets or repair them before use.
- Use no more than three standard-size sets of lights per single extension cord.
- Use only one extension cord per outlet.
- Do not run electrical cords under rugs. Walking traffic can weaken the insulation and cause the wires to overheat, increasing the chances of fire or electric shock.
- Avoid placing electrical cords behind or beneath the furniture.
   Pinched cords can fray and short.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

Well, there you have it, we hope these tips will come in handy to ensure you and your family have a safe and happy holiday season. From all of us at White House Fire Department, Happy Thanksgiving, Merry Christmas, and Happy New Year!





## **Inspection, Permitting, and Plan Review Tools**

The Planning and Codes staff has several tools at our fingertips to assist in day-to-day operations. Using GIS (Geographic Information Systems) for mapping and permitting technology, we have streamlined processes and are able to assist stakeholders more efficiently



With the growth that White House has experienced over the last few years, the use of permitting software has helped speed up the building inspection process. Since 2018 staff has gone from pen and paper, to using computer technology.

If a citizen is calling for a pool, deck or a remodel permit, staff can quickly input the request, make the appropriate review of the plan request, and schedule the inspection. Once the inspection is scheduled, it immediately is dispersed to the

building inspectors. Though we only have two building inspectors, they can provide efficient and quality inspections within a 24-hour window (during working hours) of the request. We are currently in the process of implementing a citizen self-service portal to streamline processes This portal will even further. allow residents and contractors to not only apply for inspections online, but request inspections and pay fees online. These services will always be available for stakeholders (citizens, contrac-


tors, developers etc.) to come in person, but will be a time saver for those wishing to have access to Planning and Codes digitally. The biggest thing staff is looking forward to is being able to utilize the E-Review (Electronic Review) module. We currently accept plans digitally, but there are several manual steps required throughout the course of a project. The E-Review module will implement better communication



internal and external stakeholders (Engineers etc.). Public Services, Engineering, Fire and Planning review plans in detail, and coordinate our comments to external stakeholders. We will now be able to review projects at the same time, comment and provide feedback within the software.

Implementation of the Citizen Self Service is now available. A link on the city website will allow the applicant to register and apply for various permits. We are excited to roll this out to the community to provide better response times and continue service to the citizens of White House.
