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Department Overview



New Pavilion at Soccer Complex

A Girl Scout completed her Gold Award project by constructing a muchneeded pavilion at our Soccer Complex. A Boy Scout piggybacked on that project and completed his Eagle Scout award by constructing and installing two benches underneath it. This will be a welcome addition to a park that desperately needed more shaded areas.



New ABI Infield Groomer

We purchased this brand new infield groomer this year and it is a game changer for our ballfields. This machine is specifically made for dragging baseball/softball fields, as opposed to the previous groomer we have that is made more for golf courses but doubles as something you can use to drag ballfields. This new infield groomer is also able to laser grade. So, we will be outfitting it with that capability over the next year or so, and then we will be able to start doing that ourselves which is a savings of \$1,500.00 per field each time we do it.



Rebuilt Portable Water Tank

In preparation for this planting season, we tore down and completely rebuilt a portable watering tank and watering system that we had lying around. It was nonfunctional but had great bones to it. With around \$1000 we were able to make the unit turn out like new. One of these units would cost approx. \$3,500 brand new. By rebuilding this unit we were able to save the city money, but also build the unit to the exact specifications that we needed. It should serve the city well over the course of the next few years.



Installed New Arboretum Signs

Approximately 20 new signs have been put up along the Greenway this year after the paving that took place. We will continue to do this as the Greenway is newly paved.



Brand New Zero-Turn Mower

We bought a brand new zero-turn mower this year. This brings us to the point of having a mower that each worker can use at the same time. It also has put us in a position where we don't have any zero-turns that are over 4 years old. We hope to start rotating out our oldest one in this fleet next year.



Repaired Gym Floor


Our gym floor was starting to buckle on the far end right under where the HVAC system is. It was determined to be happening because of water leaking from the outside to under the floor. We have since corrected the issue and repaired the floor.

The City purchased land this year with the intention of developing a new park. The details of that new park will be discussed over the next several years as we come up with a Master Plan. The citizens of White House along with the Leisure Service Board will drive that decision-making process to ensure the land is put to proper use.

With this new land, we now have 20.2 acres of parkland per 1,000 people. This puts us in the "Upper Quartile" when comparing to other cities across the country.







Department Programming
