






#### The new City website is live!

Christmas on Main celebration on December 3rd. We will have some music, the annual Christmas tree lighting, the reading of "The Night before Christmas", and maybe a message from Santa to all of us! Our plan is to live stream the event on social media and to record it so that you can watch it any time; this way, we can reduce the number of people at the event site.

On December 5th we will have our annual Christmas parade. The theme is "Home Town Hero's" to support all those on the front line during this COVID-19 pandemic. We hope you all will come out to support the parade. There should be plenty of open space along the route to socially distance.

January kicks off our
City's 50th anniversary year of
incorporation (1971). A committee
was formed several months ago
to begin planning for celebratory
events throughout the year. There
will be a formal proclamation
from Mayor Arnold at the January
Board of Mayor and Alderman
meeting. We will have a public
birthday party in late March. The
50th anniversary theme will be
promoted at both the Americana
Celebration in July and the
Christmas Parade in December

2021. A fall gala is also in the planning stages. Congratulations to the City of White House!

Finally, the widening project on SR76 at Interstate 65 is complete. The changes that you see were brought up in a study back in 2005! In 2012 the City requested that TDOT conduct a Road Safety Audit in that area. They did and found that the crash date in that area had risen to the point that it exceeded the statewide average for severe crashes. Thus began a very long process to get to the improvements that you get to drive on today.

The next phase of improvements along this corridor will be the widening of SR76 to four lanes from the west side of I-65 to the New Hall Road intersection. The City was able to get this project into the Improve Act (gasoline tax increase) that was written into law. This project is currently estimated at \$22 million and will have


intersection improvements at Pleasant Grove Road and New Hall. The Metropolitan Planning Organization has this project on the long range plan to be completed around the year 2035. The City is working fervently to try and get this project moved up the priority list with TDOT and the MPO. In the mean time we have added a left turn lane to Pleasant Grove Road. As funds become available we will do what we can to make safety improvements along this corridor.

The Kroger Company is expanding and remodeling their store. They will be adding 36,000 square foot to the east. Byrum Road will be shifted over. The City has approved a mixed use residential community to go behind Kroger. Byrum drive will be extended and go through the park and connect with Indian Ridge Blvd at Stadium Drive. The road will go straight through the existing tennis courts. We will work with the developer to relocate

the tennis courts a little west. Our plans are to double the number of courts we currently have available.

Tate Ornamental has built a new 93,500 square foot manufacturing facility on Industrial Drive easily visible along I-65. We sure do appreciate all the Tate family has done to provide jobs and to increase the quality of life for our community. Happy New Year...so thankful 2020 is going to be behind us (••)

In February 2021, the White House Police Department will host its sevententh annual Citizen's Police Academy. The purpose of the academy is to give citizens the opportunity to learn about police work in general and also gain insight into the

White House Police Department's daily operations and programs. The Academy will be held on Monday nights from 6:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. for ten weeks and is open to citizens 18 years of age and older and will meet at the White House Police Department at 303 North Palmers Chapel Rd. White House, Tennessee 37188. Class size is limited to 20 participants. Applications being accepted now.

The Academy is not designed to make participants certified police officers, nor does it give the graduates authority to act as police officers. The focus of the curriculum is to provide an informative overview of the fun-




**Girls' Volleyball**



# Heating Safety

There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

#### Be warm and safe this winter!

- Weep anything that can burn at least three-feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- >>> Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- >>> Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month.

#### **Heating Equipment Smarts**

Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Install and maintain CO alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning. If you smell gas in your gas heater, do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.

### FIRE DEPARTMENT





As you deck the halls this holiday season, be fire smart. A small fire that spreads to a Christmas tree can grow large very quickly.

#### Picking the tree

• Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.

#### Placing the tree

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily.

#### Lighting the tree

- Use lights that have the label of a recognized testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.

• Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

#### **After Christmas**

- Get rid of the tree after Christmas or when it is dry. Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against the home.
- Check with your local community to find a recycling program.
- Bring outdoor electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and make them last longer.

#### FACTS

- More than one of every four home Christmas tree fires is caused by electrical problems.
- ! Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious.
- A heat source too close to the tree causes one in every four of the fires.

available to fund capital improvement projects, maintenance, inspections and water quality services throughout the City. Her role requires strong communication and written skills, and she has shown that she not only has these skills, but that she also has the ability to inspire respect and cooperation in her teammates and her colleagues. Aujuah has adequately staffed a stormwater crew who performs mitigation through ditch rehabilitation and infrastructure design and has completed over 60 workorders regarding drainage and/or flooding concerns. Her expertise in biology has assisted in stream monitoring and illicit discharge detection and elimination. She consistently accomplishes any task assigned to her with enthusiasm. As such, Aujuah Jackson is a great candidate for this award. Thank you for your consideration.

Aujuah is fair to all residents, developers, and builders. She takes the time to meet, discuss, and educate individuals about topography's, potential problems, ordinances, planning, management of daily operations and maintenance within the stormwater system. With the implementation of long and short-term prioritization of projects, Aujuah does a great job understanding the value of community concerns and individual needs. This is a daunting task

that has to be accomplished with professionalism and a great understanding of the city's infrastructure. She uses GIS, engineering plans, and the knowledge of stormwater practices with regard to City/State/Federal Codes and regulations. Aujuah, in conjunction with Public Works, is currently completing a stormwater and road widening project where she split the responsibility of being the project manager.

She coordinated work schedules, deliveries, and met/dealt with vendors to coordinate provisions.

In conclusion, I believe Aujuah is a great asset to the environmental/stormwater community and to the City of White House. She has shown exceptional excellence with regard to compliance and outreach. Thank you Aujuah, great job and congratulations.

The City of White House was also recognized and won the TNSA Organization of the Year: An MS4 or other Organization that displays Exceptional stewardship of Water Quality in Tennessee and provides Exceptional education and assistance to MS4s.

In mid 2003, the City of White House received notification from the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) that we would be regulated for stormwater under current federal laws. In 2010, census indicated that the City of White House was meeting the criteria for population and area (density) that qualified our city as a Municipal Separate Storm System (MS4) and the consequent state permit requirements. Since its implementation, the City of White House has strived to become a frontrunner through

community outreach, research and development, and identifying ways to reduce erosion/runoff with the

least amount of environmental impact. Things we do:

- Conduct a Stormwater Advisory Board Meeting Every Three Months with Directors, City Administrator, Public Partners and Community Members
- Monthly project updates with all Department heads


through PowerPoint presentations

- Conducting Hydraulic studies to define hot spots throughout our city and identifying solutions for remediation

**FALL FOLIAGE FOULS** 

<u>How Leaves Cause Problems for Local</u> <u>Drainage Systems</u>

Falling temperatures, falling rain and falling leaves. For municipalities, these seasonal changes bring new challenges. Decaying organic materials, like leaf litter, can release excess nutrients into local streams and lakes, causing eutrophication and algal blooms. Leaves are a significant source of phosphorus to urban stormwater and lead to depleted oxygen content in water which can threaten human and wildlife health. These water quality problems are hazardous but also preventable.

Helpful Tips:

Make compost! Mix grass clippings with leaves and soil. Leaves help retain moisture in the soil around your plants, insulate plant roots during cold weather, and provide organic matter and nutrients to your plant as the leaves decompose. Your garden will be thankful.

<u>Don't Blow It!</u> Leaves and other yard debris can be collected at the curbside on your designated pickup day or brought to our facility located at 725 Industrial Dr., White House, TN 37188.

Notify Us! The City performs routine street sweeping and can add your neighborhood to the schedule.

nce a year, the City of White House Public Services Department holds an annual luncheon to recognize individuals that have shown outstanding workmanship and dedication to our great city. The City of White H use Public Works Department offers a variety of services for our citizens.

Here are a few excerpts from our Municipal Technical Advisory Service (MTAS) codes that may be useful. Please review Title:17 Chapter 1 for a complete List of Municipal Codes. 17-105. Location of containers Location of containers. All residents, except those approved for special assistance due to age, handicap or illness (See § 17-105(4)) shall place their wheeled container at curbside or street-side no later than 6:30 A.M. on the date of anticipated collection. As soon as practicable after such containers have been emptied, they shall be removed by the owner or occupant to within, or to the rear of their premises and away from the street line until the next scheduled time for collection.

(1) Each owner, occupant, or other responsible person, as foresaid, shall be responsible for keeping the refuse container clean and sanitary in compliance with health and sanitation requirements and shall keep container lids closed at all times. No refuse shall be placed in container until such refuse has been drained free of all liquids and securely placed in plastic bags

If 17-105 is not observed, it may cause trash service to be denied, as per our Municipal Code **Brush Collection** 

17-108. Nurserymen, Landscapers and Independent hired contractors – duty to remove trash. Every nurseryman or other person who cuts trees or trims shrubs or grass as an independent contractor of the occupant of the premises, shall remove or cause to be removed all such trash from the premises serviced by him/her. (1979

Code, § 8-208, as replaced by Ord. #05-35, Nov. 2005)

17-113. Fee schedule.

(3) Fee schedule for disposal at Public Works Facility:

Single item: \$15 Pick-up truck load: (Drop off Only)

\$50 Tires (on or off rim): (Drop off Only)

\$10 Any load containing tires or an item that would fit in the single item category will be charged \$50 plus the cost of additional item(s). (Drop off Only)

Customer requested pickup will be double the above amounts

(4) Brush and limbs will be accepted at the public works facility free of charge.

(5) Residents and commercial accounts that have city provided solid waste disposal service shall be allowed two (2) free disposal drop-offs per calendar year at the public services trash transfer station. The material load shall be limited to a pickup truck, or a trailer no larger in size than four by eight feet (4' x 8'). (as added by Ord. #05-35, Nov. 2005, and amended by Ord. #07-18, June 2007, Ord. #14-12, June 2014, and Ord. #16-23, Jan.
