This month kicks off our City's 50th anniversary vear of incorporation (1971). We started the celebration

with a formal proclamation from Mayor Arnold at the January Board of Mayor and Alderman meeting. Also, Aldermen Clif Hutson and John Corbitt were sworn in for another 4 years of service. We will have a public birthday party in late March. The 50th anniversary theme will be promoted at both the Americana Celebration in July and the Christmas Parade in December. A fall gala is also in the planning stages. Congratulations to the City of White House!

We had some really good news at our December Board of Mayor and Alderman meeting. Kraft CPAs gave us our Annual Audit Report and indicated that we had no findings. We were very excited to hear this. We have worked diligently for several years to get our financial records to this level to meet all reporting guidelines and requirements. I am so thankful to the staff in all departments that manage grants, purchasing processes, taking in revenues, managing inventories, and managing debt to the level of excellence!

We had some really sad news in December. Building Inspector Tony Covington and his family lost their home the week before Christmas to a devastating fire. The house was a total loss. Three of their family pets perished in the fire. The family has found temporary housing. Many of you

have helped with clothing and food for the family. Please keep the family in your prayers as they rebuild their house and home. The family thanks you for your kindness to them during this difficult time.

The Kroger Company has broken ground on their renovation and 36,000 square foot expansion. The Fields of Oakwood. a Ryan Homes single family home development, is nearly complete with their model homes. This subdivision at the intersection of Wilkinson Lane and Calista Road will feature 222 one level living homes. The building that is under construction next to the new Auto Zone on SR76 will feature Little Caesars and another business yet to be disclosed. Construction is under way on the south side of Deer Crossing near Colorado Grill. This will feature 48 apartment homes to match the ones on the north side of the center. We have approved a small commercial building at the front of Twin Springs Apartments on US31W. This building is expected to have two small eateries. Tractor Supply has taken another look at us. I hope to share more information about them in the next Word on White House. Practicing more kindness,



In addition to annual maintenance, here are some tips to winterize your car: Test your battery; battery power drops as the temperature drops Make sure the cooling system is in good working order Have winter tires with a deeper, more flexible tread put on your car If using all-season tires, check the tread on your tires and replace if less than 2/32 of an inch Check the tire pressure; tire pressure drops as the temperature drops Check your wiper blades and replace them if needed Add wiper fluid rated for -30 degrees Keep your gas tank at least half full to avoid gas line freeze Remember to keep your car's emergency preparedness kit fully stocked, too.

Before you start out - clean your car's external camera lenses and side-view mirrors so you'll be able to see what's around you Remove dirt, ice, and snow from sensors to allow the assistivedriving features like automatic emergency braking to work In frigid





weather, you may want to warm up the car before you drive it To prevent carbon monoxide poisoning, never leave a vehicle running in your garage - even with the garage door up If the forecast looks iffy, wait out the storm if possible; if you must travel, share your travel plans and route with someone before you leave How to Avoid a Crash AAA offers the following driving tips: Avoid using cruise control in wintry conditions Steer in the direction of a skid, so when your wheels regain traction, you don't have to overcorrect to stay in your lane Accelerate and decelerate slowly Increase following distance to 8 to 10 seconds If possible, don't stop when going uphill If visibility is severely limited due to a whiteout, pull off the road to a safe place and do not drive until conditions improve. Avoid pulling off onto the shoulder unless it is an absolute emergency. Limited visibility means other vehicles can't see vours on the shoulder.



White House Inn Museum Presents 'To Make Our Voices Heard: Tennessee Women's Fight for the Vote

Exhibition open through March 2021 showcasing the events leading up to Tennessee's ratification of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution



nessee State Museum. "We are thrilled to have the opportunity to share these stories across the state."

To Make Our Voices Heard: Tennessee Women's Fight for the Vote is organized by the Tennessee State Museum and the Tennessee State Library and Archives with funding provided by The Official Committee of the State of Tennessee Woman Suffrage Centennial. The project is also funded in part by a grant from Humanities Tennessee, an independent affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The White House Inn Museum is located at 412 Highway 76. Admission to the museum is free, Monday through Thursday 9 am to 4 pm. Fridays and weekends are available by appointment. If you would like to schedule a tour for a large group, contact Susan Holcraft, Museum Director at 615-672-3937.

White House Inn Museum presents To Make Our Voices Heard: Tennessee Women's Fight for the Vote, a new traveling exhibition, on display through March 2021. The exhibition, created in partnership with the Tennessee State Museum and the Tennessee State Library and Archives, explores the history of the woman's suffrage movement, Tennessee's dramatic vote to ratify the 19th Amendment in 1920, and the years that followed.

The exhibition is constructed of multiple dynamic panels, offering guests a touch-free experience of archival images, engaging stories and introductions to the leaders of the fight for and against the cause of woman's suffrage. The stories begin by detailing the early challenges of racial and gender discrimination and continuing to the organization of African American and white women's associations to encourage political engagement.

Visitors will also learn about Febb Burn of Mc-Minn County, whose letter to her son, Harry T. Burn, resulted in a last-minute vote that helped change women's history in the United States forever.

The exhibit includes a Tennessee map, highlighting suffragist activities across the state. "Tennessee's

role in becoming the 36th and final state to ratify the 19th Amendment not only solidified women's right to vote but propelled women across the country to opportunities and futures they never thought possible," said Chuck Sherrill, State Librarian and Archivist with the Tennessee State Library & Archives. "The hope of the committee is this centennial celebration will do the same all across our state."

In coordination with this traveling exhibit, the Tennessee State Museum in Nashville has opened Ratified! Tennessee Women and the Right to Vote, an extensive 8,000 square foot exhibition exploring the Women's Suffrage movement in Tennessee through archival images and documents, artifacts, films, interactive elements, and programming.

An online component of the exhibition, Ratified! Statewide! highlighting the suffrage movement in every Tennessee county is available now at tnmuseum.

"As we commemorate the historic vote that took place at Tennessee's State Capitol in August of 1920, we want to honor those individuals who played key roles in the journey to gain voting rights for women," said Ashley Howell, Executive Director of the Ten-

Rightfully Hers pop up exhibit also on display

The White House Inn Museum is hosting an exhibition from the National Archives, Rightfully Hers, commemorating the 100th anniversary of the ratification of the 19th Amendment. Rightfully Hers contains simple messages exploring the history of the ratification of the 19th amendment, women's voting rights before and after the 19th, and its impact today. Despite decades of marches, petitions, and public debate to enshrine a woman's right to vote in the constitution, the 19th Amendment – while an enormous milestone – did not grant voting rights for all. The challenges of its passage reverberate to the ongoing fight for gender equity today. This exhibit runs through March 2021.

Rightfully Hers co-curator Jennifer N. Johnson states: "The ratification of the 19th Amendment was a landmark moment in American history that dramatically changed the electorate, and although it enshrined in the U.S. Constitution fuller citizenship for women many remained unable to vote."

Rightfully Hers is organized by the National Ar-chives and Records Administration. The exhibition is presented in part by the Women's Suffrage Centen-nial Commission and the National Archives Founda-tion through the generous support of Unilever, Piv-otal Ventures, Carl M. Freeman Foundation in honor of Virginia Allen Freeman, AARP, and Denise Gwyn Ferguson.








FIRE DEPARTMENT WINTER DRIVING

SAFETY TIPS

▲ /inter driving can be challenging, especially for new drivers or those not familiar with our lovely Northeast winters. Around 30% of hospitalizations and injuries from accidents and injuries occur due to adverse winter driving conditions, rain and fog.

It is essential that during the winter season we have the vehicle ready for any unforeseen event that may occur. The following are essential tips for driving safely this winter:

Extra time: Allow for extra travel time and unanticipated traffic delays. It's better to plan on your trip taking longer and arriving safely.

Inspect the vehicle: Before embarking on a trip be sure that your car is in the right condition to travel, consider the potential for unexpected storms. Check the coolant, antifreeze, top off the windshield wiper fluid, oil, steering fluid and check that the tire treads are appropriate. Consider a set of all seasons or winter tires for the heavy snow. Proper tires offer a stable and optimum pattern for grip on poorly adherent surfaces.

Use of the safety belt: It's the law and it makes good common sense for all passengers to be belted while the vehicle is moving; Rear seat passengers are not exempt from injury.

Driving smoothly: Adapt the speed of the vehicle to the weather conditions. To operate safely, make sure to avoid sudden changes in direction or swerving.

Making gentle turns will decrease the odds of losing movements from one side to the other until the vehicle stops. steering INTO the skid.

Maintain safety distance: It is important to drive with a proper driving safety distance and increase that distance during adverse weather conditions,

Equipment: We recommend keeping the following in your vehicle in case of emergencies: a flashlight, warm blankets, reflective vest, spare change of clothing and a scraper or brush to remove snow and ice.

> Remember, snow must be removed from the car before driving otherwise it becomes a hazard to others.

> Other recommendations: Check the condition of the to make it easier for snow removal and lessen the your windshield.

Driving according to the type of adverse weather

With snow and ice: It is likely that in the winter season the snow and ice are abundant, so it is advisable to move slowly. We must take special care with brakes, since they do not usually work properly on icy roads. Drive with great caution, increase your following distance between vehicles and drive slowly.

With wind: When the wind blows excessively strong, we must slow down the vehicle and firmly hold the steering wheel, especially if you are passing a large vehicle.

A common misconception is that it is okay to flush wipes down the toilet. With COVID-19, we have seen shelves empty of disinfecting wipes and it's not just wipes that need to be kept out of a home's pipes. The same is true for certain feminine/male products, paper towels, and grease that's been put down a kitchen sink. Because wipes don't break down in water, they can clog plumbing systems in a home, and damage pipes and

machinery at our local wastewater facility/pump stations/ & grinder stations. Many wipes are made of synthetic materials. These materials, when combined with other personal hygiene products that are flushed and grease that is poured down drains, create what waste workers refer to as "fatbergs" in sewers. These items are things that should never be flushed down the toilet or sink.

The City of White House Public Services department

cares about our citizens, as a result, there are several locations throughout the city that offer an LED Enhanced Warning System – known as LaneLight. Locations include Tyree Springs by White House High School, 31W by

White House Animal Hospital and coming soon to Hwy 76 by Fire Station #1. LaneLight has been providing A Safer Way Home with their in-road, flashing pedestrian crosswalk systems. LaneLights alert the driver without adding roadside clutter and are very effective in

applications such as mid-block crosswalks, roundabouts, and

in-road systems are engineered to survive in the toughest road conditions. Activated by the pedestrian through a push button seen below, a LaneLight crosswalk system flashes a barrier of daytime visible LEDS directly in the driver's line of sight making the crosswalk dramatically

more visible. Under Tennessee law, pedestrians have the right of way at all intersections and driveways. However, pedestrians must act responsibly, using pedestrian signals and sidewalks where they are available.

Fence Permits

Thinking of building a fence on your property? You'll need a permit. Ordinance 20-12 was approved and adopted in August 2020. This permit is to ensure that your fence design, size, scale and material are built to code and approved by the City.

homeowners should be aware of the following before constructing a fence: Call before you Dig! You must call Tennessee 811 in order to prevent

damage to underground utilities. It is a free service and should be given no less than 3 workings days' notice. No fence or wall shall be installed within an easement or public ROW so as to not block or divert the natural drainage flow on or off any other land.

A plot plan, copy of a marked survey, or site plan prepared to scale by a registered surveyor is preferred.
All fences and walls shall be maintained in good repair and condition.
