In the early 80s, city hall was receiving so many phone calls, that Mayor Hobbs decided they needed a front desk for the community. He gathered a group of community and business leaders that included Jarmin Cranor, Don Eden, Wayne Boger, Dr. Phil Vickery and a few others to establish the White House Area Chamber of Commerce.

A membership drive was launched and the Chamber, that began with 12 members, grew to over 50 in a short time.

The Chamber hosted a community pancake breakfast that was hugely popular. At one of these breakfasts, the idea to build a library for the city turned into a Homecoming '86 campaign led by the Chamber. With the support of the community and leaders across the state, the project quickly became building a replica of the White House Inn

that would house the library and archives. Through the years the chamber has grown to be the voice of business in the White House area with over 350 members.

Once a volunteer led organization, the chamber now employs three full-time employees, has a 13 person Board of Directors and countless volunteers. The Chamber team works closely with city, county and state leaders to provide education and networking opportunities for their members. They produce events that improve quality of life in White House and work to recruit business and industry through economic development.

The replica that the Chamber helped to build in 1985 became their new home in 2017 after being remodeled when the library moved into its new home. The White House Area Chamber of Commerce, White House Inn Museum and the Visitor's Center are located in the iconic building at 412 Hwy. 76.

What is a columbarium? A columbarium is kind of like a mausoleum. It is an above ground burial tomb. The big difference is that it is only for cremations enclosed in urns.

Do you know what you would do with your loved ones cremation? Hillcrest Municipal Cemetery now offers a lower cost alternative.



Our columbarium has 48 niches (hollow spaces) for the safe keeping of your loved one. Each niche can accommodate two family members.

## Single Stream Curbside Recycling to City of White House Residents

### What is Single Stream Recycling?

Single stream recycling is a method of collecting select recyclable materials that are mixed together in the same container.

### Why recycle?

Recycling saves our natural resources and keeps re-usable items out of the landfills.

### What kind of container will you use?

Waste Industries will provide 95 gallon roll out carts that can be rolled to the curb in front of your home every other week on Friday. You will receive information in the mail regarding your week of service.

All service started on December 7, 2012.

### What is expected of you?

Contamination is always a factor when we collect recyclables, therefore, we ask that you only place the materials listed on the reverse of this flyer. They can be mixed in the same container (cans and plastic bottles should be rinsed to avoid contamination).

## Single Stream Recycling Guidelines

### RECYCLABLE Materials Allowed

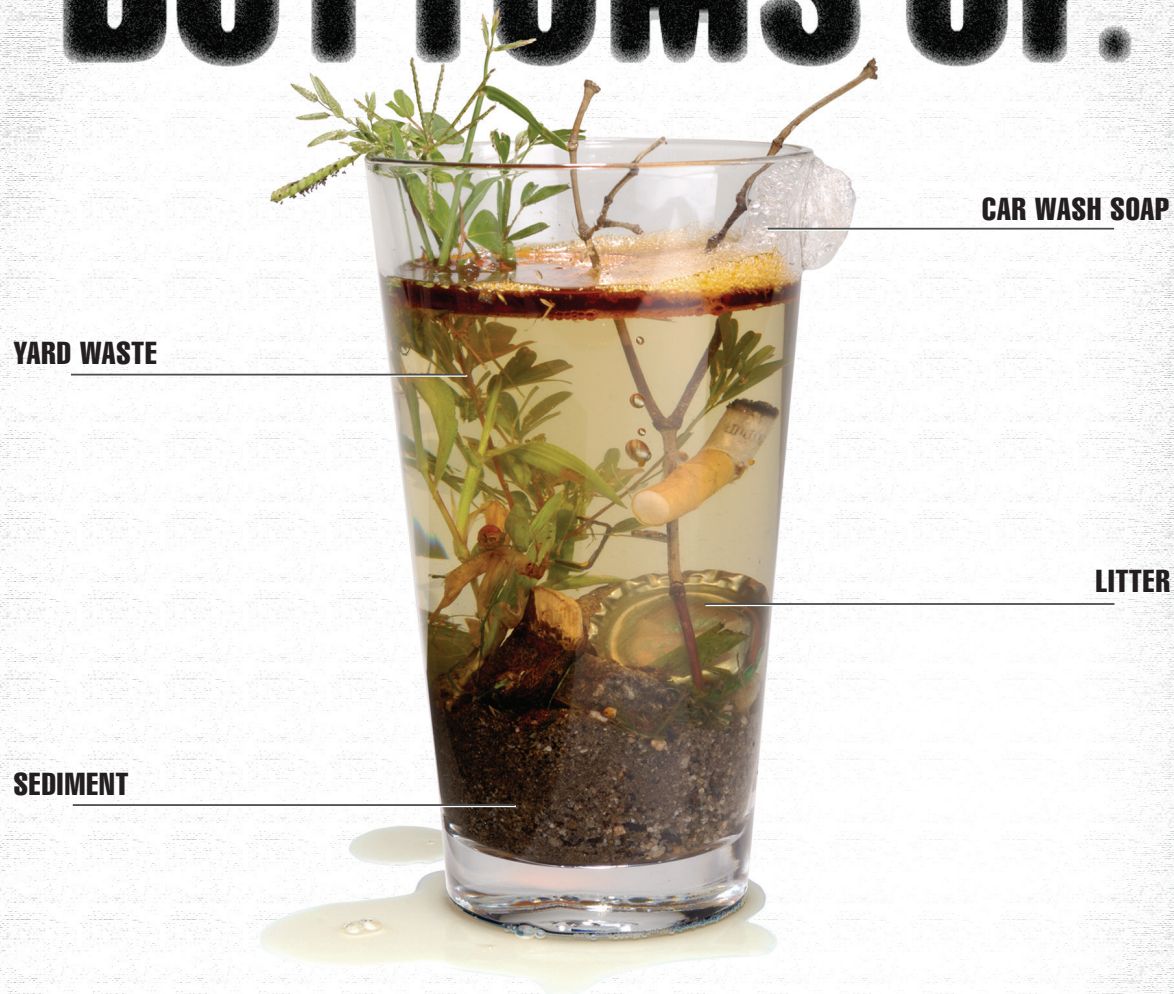
- **Metal Cans** {Aluminum, Bi-Metal & Steel}: Includes soft drink, beverage and food cans - please empty and rinse out the cans, empty aerosol cans.
- **Paper Products**: Includes newspapers, office paper, computer paper, magazines, junk mail, shiny paper inserts, telephone books, paper board (cereal boxes) and paper grocery bags.
- **Plastic Containers**: Includes all PET 1 through 7 containers: soft drink bottles, milk jugs and detergent bottles. Check the bottom of the container. If you see the recycling symbol with a #1 through #5 or #7 in the center, it is acceptable. Remove all caps, rinse, and flatten before putting it in the recycling container.

## Materials That Are NOT Allowed

- **No Plastic grocery bags, egg cartons or Styrofoam:** only plastics labeled 1 through 7 are allowed.
- **No Coat Hangers, Lids Or Other Scrap Metal:** If it is not a food or beverage container, it is not allowed.
- **No Books:** Hard cover books are not allowed but magazines and telephone directories are.
  - **No Glass Beverage Bottles & Food Jars**
  - **No Glassware:** ceramic glass, drinking glasses, mirrors, window panes or plate glass, light bulbs (incandescent or fluorescent)
  - **No motor oil, insecticide, herbicide or hazardous chemical containers.**
  - **No liquid of any kind**

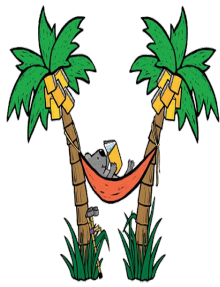

### How to Sign Up

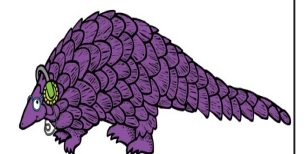

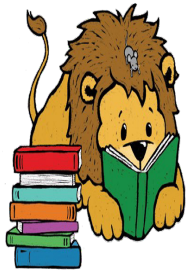
You can sign up just yourself or an entire family. Login to READSquared or download the app to log your minutes.
